# FROM THE PASTOR'S CORNER

## 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year "C" Paul says to Philemon – "Welcome Onesimus as you would of me"

At the age of just 12, Bill Wilson was abandoned by his mother on a street corner. He sat and waited for her mother at that same spot for three full days, but she never came back for him.

Countless people walked by this young boy sitting out on the street corner. Finally, a man who was on his way to see his son in the hospital stopped and asked him if he was okay. After learning of his situation, the man got him some food, made some calls, and within five hours he was on a bus headed to a Christian summer camp.

Bill's family hadn't been the particularly a religious type, so, that camp was the first time he had ever heard about God or Jesus. Much to his dismay, Bill discovered that at that "Christian" summer camp nobody would pray for him at the altar because of how badly he looked and smelled.

Instead, all alone, he went to the altar and attempted his own prayer to God: "My mother doesn't want me. The Christians don't want me. But if you want me, here I am."

God's response to Bill was instant and resounding: "YES, I want you!" That moment forever changed the course of his life.

That first experience of knowing he was loved and wanted by God, put Bill on the path into the Christian ministry. While he was a teenager, he was given a job at his local congregation. After his high school graduation, he was encouraged to attend a seminary. He studied at Southeastern University and got his degree in theology.

But a pulpit and a steeple was not the kind of ministry Bill felt called to. Rather, in 1980, he established Metro World Ministry in Bushwick, Brooklyn. At the time, Bushwick was one of New York's toughest neighborhoods, known for its gang violence, crime, drugs, and poverty.

Armed with a bull horn, a station wagon, and Yogi Bear costumes, Bill went through the streets inviting and driving children to his fun, welcoming Sunday school program.

When he quickly outgrew the station wagon, Bill bought a bus. In order to use the former brewery where his programming was housed; he took his ministry to the streets, creating the idea of a Sidewalk Sunday School. He converted trucks to serve as portable stages from which his team of ministers could share their message in hard to reach neighborhoods. Soon, he expanded his ministry into all five boroughs of New York City.

Today, Pastor Bill's unique concepts of school bus outreach and weekend-long Sunday School programs that feed and love kids who otherwise would have none of these things are now replicated globally.... (Hillside Community Church).

Thanks to the word of God, lives, nations, empires and kingdoms have been changed for good. Onesimus was a slave who was convicted for a crime we do not know whether he committed or was just a victim of oppression and injustice.

Since there is neither an accident nor a coincidence in God, Onesimus time with Paul during his imprisonment (Paul was in prison for preaching and witnessing to the resurrection of Jesus Christ), changed his life forever.

It bothers me though that Paul did not seize the opportunity of his encounter with Onesimus to condemn the institution and practice of slavery especially since the practice goes completely against the message of the Gospel for which Paul was a prisoner. Or did the editor intentionally omit any part of Paul's letter to Philemon?

However, Paul's way of reaching out to Philemon is worthy of admiration. Paul says "Therefore, although in Christ I could be bold and order you to do what you ought to do, yet I prefer to appeal to you on the basis of love. It is none other than Paul—an old man and now also a prisoner of Christ Jesus—that I appeal to you for my son Onesimus, who became my son while I was in chains . . . welcome him as you would welcome me" (Philemon 8-10,17).

Paul is bold to say this because in Christ there are no prisoners. On the cross, Jesus paid the price of our sin in full. Once one has come to know God, he is no longer bound by the convictions of men. He is free in Christ and if you are free in Christ, you are free indeed. Gal 3:28 - "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus."

Paul knows that by running away from his master Philemon, Onesimus deserves to be flogged and even killed. Paul did not bother about all that. Paul would instead ask Philemon to treat Onesimus like a brother in Christ. Paul's request is both radical and transformational in nature and it will only take the grace of God to be able to accept it. Hence, from Paul we learn that grace trumps justice and renews us in Christ.

From Paul we learn the power of intercession – If you have wondered why people ask others to pray for them or you have resisted asking others to pray for you, what Paul did for Onesimus is a good example of why we should not hesitate to ask others to pray for us. Like the Blessed Virgin Mary at the wedding feast at Cana in Galilee, by interceding on behalf of Onesimus, Paul did for Onesimus what Onesimus could not do for himself.

There is power in prayer. The prayer of a humble and contrite heart can move mountains and open the heavens. To Philemon, Onesimus was a slave boy, but not so for Paul. By the power of the cross, humanity has been liberated from slavery to sin, and it is by the power of the cross for which Paul was in prison, that he ministered to Onesimus. Wherever the cross of Jesus abounds, there is freedom and redemption.

From this encounter we see a new definition of the cross – carrying the cross of Jesus liberates us from slavery to sin. When we develop a good relationship with Jesus, whether in the case of Bill, Paul, Onesimus and Philemon, there is no limit to the favors we could ask or receive from God. If Philemon could grant Paul's request, how much more will God bless those who call upon Him in love and trust.

Make no mistake about it; the Onesimus of today is you and I. By telling us today to carry our cross to follow Him, Jesus invites us to develop a confident trust in God's power to heal and save us. To the world, the cross is a symbol of abandonment but for Christians, the cross is a symbol of divine invitation. Whenever we abandon ourselves to God, God enriches and blesses us, empowering us to do great things for God in the world. Amen






