FROM THE PASTOR'S CORNER

27th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year "C"

**"We are unprofitable servants;
we have done what we are obliged to do."**

In England in 1920 there was a graduation ceremony for a batch of new doctors. It was attended by the British Prime Minister of that time. During the ceremony, the head doctor in charge of that batch gave the necessary advice to the new graduates.

He told them an incident which happened to him some time ago: "It was after midnight, and I heard a knock on my door. It was an old lady, and she said to me: 'O my doctor; my child is sick and in a very serious condition, so please do something to save him.'

I rushed out to follow her to her house without worrying what will happen. It was a stormy night, and very cold. The rain was pouring down very heavily. I did not fear for my life.

Her house was on the outskirts of London, and after a difficult journey, we reached her house.

She lived in a small room with her son. When I entered the room, I saw her son at the corner of the room groaning and deeply in pain.

After I did my duty towards the sick child, the mother gave me a small bag with money. I refused to take the bag and I told her gently that I can't accept the payment, because I felt sorry for their situation.

Then I promised her that I will take care of her child until he gets better."

The head doctor continued his speech by saying: "This is the true profession of medicine, and being a doctor is the closest profession to mercy and one closest to God"

As soon as the head doctor finished his speech, the Prime Minister jumped out of his seat and headed toward the podium. "Permit me Sir, to kiss your hand.

For twenty years, I have been looking for you. I am the child you mentioned in your story just now. Oh, my mother will be happy now and she will rest in peace. Her only wish was for me to find you and to reward you, for that good you did for us at the time we were living in poverty."

That poor child who later became the Prime Minister of England was: "Lloyd George" (Author unknown).

In the world, nobody wants to become a servant to another person. There is more joy in being served than in serving. We want to become masters and lords and to be served by others. The master eats first while the servant is the last to eat and would always eat the leftover.

Having the mindset of a servant is not one that comes ordinarily to us and to say the least it is not a mindset that many people would like to embrace and emulate.

It is interesting that Jesus would use the imagery of a servant to teach us the best recipe to a happy life on earth. When Jesus says that we should be like a servant who has just returned from plowing or tending sheep in the fields – such a servant is certainly hungry and tired, yet, it is his responsibility to serve his master before eating and going to rest, Jesus wants us to understand that Christian life is not a life of honor and convenience.

We are not meant to serve God only when things are convenient and going well for us. It is in the midst of our pains and worries that we are expected to serve and honor God. Serving God even when things are not convenient is only possible if one has a strong and deep rooted faith in God. Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen (Heb 11:1). Authentic faith consists in believing that the word of God is true and making a concerted effort to commit our lives to it.

Like any precious gem, authentic faith can be lost if one did not make an effort to protect it. We need to work hard daily to protect and preserve the faith we have. Like a precious gift, authentic faith is not given to all. You may think that you have come to have faith because you were born into a catholic family with parents who helped you to nurture it. Some think that they came to have faith because they studied in Catholic Schools where their faith in God developed and was nourished. Some people think they came to have faith because they read the Bible and other spiritual and religious books that helped them to have faith. Some people believe that they came to have faith due to the good examples of their fellow human beings.

No matter how you came to become a person of faith, one thing is clear – faith is a gift from God. There are some people whose parents were and are strong Catholics; some who studied in Catholic schools, some who read the Bible and many religious books but today they do not have faith. If you still have faith, preserve, protect and nourish it. It is the best gift you have and it is the best gift that you can offer to others.

By using the imagery of a servant, Jesus teaches us the best way to practice our faith. True faith should keep us humble like servants. Like the medical doctor, true faith should inspire us to serve and not to be served. True faith should make us to use our talent, time and treasure to work for the good of others.

By using the imagery of a servant, God wants us to understand that religion is a culture of love and service. Religious life is not a life of competition. People who compete could hardly become friends. In competition, it is the winner that takes it all. This should not become the way of the children of God. The competition we see among different religions in the world today is nothing but a disservice to God. It makes a mockery of religion and in the ends leads to damnation.

Whenever religion becomes a tool of oppression and whenever our faith in God becomes a justifying reason to maltreat others, we miss the mark. Like servants, no one should go into reckoning with God. We cannot say "God I have done this and that, therefore, you owe me this and that." Like the master who does not owe his servant any act of gratitude for doing what the servant is supposed to do, God does not owe any human being anything for the good we have done. Our good deeds are nothing compared to what Jesus did for us on the cross. After we have done all that we are supposed to do, it is God who rewards the faithful in the way that only God knows best.

Make no mistake about it – one thing is certain – every good deed unites us with the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross. Therefore, no good deed goes unrewarded by God. God rewards every good deed. God has done it in the past, God is still doing it today and God will continue to bless those who reach out in love to those in need of their help. Amen



Recordemos a Nuestros fieles Difuntos


