FROM THE PASTOR'S CORNER

3rd Sunday of Easter, Year "A" **The disciples on the road to Emmaus ... at the breaking of bread they discovered Jesus.**

Once upon a time there was a young man who on his 37th birthday, and after spending most of his adult life loosely dating different women, he finally decided he was ready to settle down. He wanted to find a real mate... a lover... a life partner—someone who could show him what it means to be in a deep, monogamous, trusting relationship.

So, he searched far and wide. There were so many women to choose from, all with great qualities, but none with everything he was looking for. And then, finally, just when he thought he would never find her, he found her. And she was perfect. She had everything he ever wanted in a woman. And he rejoiced, for he knew how rare a find she was. "I've done my research," he told her. "You are the one for me."

But as the days and weeks turned into months and years, he started to realize that she was far from perfect. She had issues with trust and self-confidence, she likes to be silly when he wanted to be serious, and she was much messier than he was. And he started to have doubts ... doubts about her, doubts about himself, doubts about everything.

And to validate these doubts, he subconsciously tested her. He constantly looked around their apartment for things that weren't clean just to prove that she was messy. He decided to go out alone to parties with his single guy friends just to prove that she had trust issues. He set her up and waited for her to do something silly just to prove she couldn't be serious. It went on like this for awhile.

As the tests continued—and as she, clearly shaken and confused, failed more and more often—he became more and more convinced that she was not a perfect fit for him after all. Because he had dated women in the past who were more mature, more confident, and more willing to have serious conversations.

Inevitably, he found himself at a crossroads. Should he continue to be in a relationship with a woman whom he once thought was perfect, but now realizes is lacking the qualities that he already found in the other women that came before her? Or should he return to the lifestyle he had come from, drifting from one empty relationship to the next? (Story by Marc Chenoff)

One may begin to wonder what this story has got to do with the story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus. Like the young man, the disciples were in a relationship with Jesus. This is a lovely relationship with great expectations.

Now the two disciples on the way to Emmaus are struggling with their expectations versus the reality. Expectation is what we think will happen while reality is what actually happened. While we hope that our expectation will match up with the reality, it oftentimes does not and this leads to feelings of disappointment, sadness rejection and unhappiness.

The disciples on the road to Emmaus who had abandoned many things to follow Jesus had high expectations that Jesus was up to something big, and truly He was. But, the disciples had a wrong notion of the messiah and the kingdom Jesus had come to establish on earth. When they thought that Jesus was about to establish His kingdom, the death of Jesus dashed all their hopes and expectations. Hence, they started to go back to their former way of life at Emmaus.

It is true that Jesus promised to establish a kingdom but rather than listen to understand the nature of the kingdom, the disciples had in their minds the type of kingdom that they want Jesus to establish. Even as Jesus talked about a kingdom governed by the power of love, the disciples wanted a kingdom governed by the love of power – a prosperous and material kingdom flowing with milk and honey.

Like the apostles of Jesus, these disciples had hoped that Jesus will restore the kingdom of David to Israel, an affluent kingdom that will empower Israel to reign once more as the superpower over other nations and the disciples would become the lieutenants of Jesus

In this life it takes some level of moral and spiritual rectitude for people to come to appreciate, understand and accept some truth. This is what Jesus had to grapple with as He met and discussed with the two disciples who were already on the way back to their village to return to life as usual.

Of interest here is to note that these disciples had enough knowledge of scripture to understand what had happened to Jesus but they lacked the faith to accept and believe it. To them, the death of Jesus on the cross no matter where it will lead was not an option they were willing to accept.

It is at this lowest ebb of their lives that Jesus reached out to them and challenged them to take a new look at what they already know from the scriptures which says that "it was necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory."

At the breaking of bread, the disciples discovered Jesus and they said "were not our hearts burning within us while He spoke to us on the way and opened the scriptures to us?" Breaking of bread and Eucharistic celebration are synonymous. It is in the celebration of the Eucharist that Jesus continues to reveal Himself to us. We who celebrate and receive the body and blood of Christ are empowered to make Jesus visible to others in the world.

Whenever we discover Jesus, like the disciples we return to Jerusalem/ Church. The church is a visible sign of the kingdom of God in the world and it is only in the church that our expectations and the reality become intertwined. The church remains a place of worship where believers keep faith in the resurrection of Jesus alive. Through worship we say it loud and clear to the world that we no longer belong to Emmaus. We belong to the Church, the city of the living God.

Therefore, it is a contradiction for a believer in the resurrection of Jesus to refuse to join the people of God to praise and worship God at mass especially on Sundays. And for those who have decided to praise and worship God, our praise and worship should not stop in the church. It is from our church worship that we draw strength to witness and put into practice the power of the risen Lord in the world by loving and serving others.

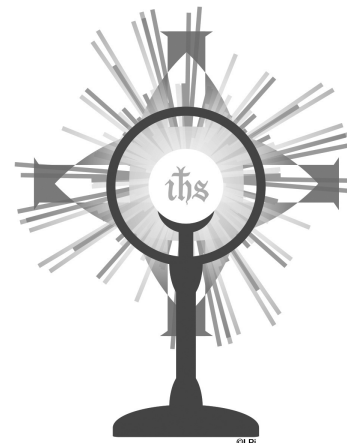


VISITA NUESTRA CAPILLA
